The George Floyd protests of 2020 caused nearly 2 billion dollars in property damage throughout the country, injured thousands of police officers, and left 30 people dead41
In the months since the deadly attack on the U.S. Capitol on January 6th, 2021, some politicians have repeatedly sought to downplay the violence, calling the insurrection "mostly peaceful," and referring to the rioters held in jail as "political prisoners."
Since the contentious 2020 election, election workers and volunteers and their families have been subjected to violent threats. One in three election workers no longer feel safe, and one in six have reported receiving work-related threats 27
An anti-government militia group in Michigan launched a plot to kidnap Governor Gretchen Whitmer to protest her COVID policies
Educators and local school boards are under attack. Some people have threatened to bring guns to meetings in communities throughout the country and school board members are resigning as threats against their families escalate.
In 2020, armed protestors carrying assault rifles and handguns gathered outside a polling station in Arizona to demand election workers stop counting ballots. The disruption forced the polling center to shut down
In 2020, armed militias stormed state capitols, including Michigan's state capitol in Lansing, to protest COVID restrictions
In 2020, protesters against racism in rural Indiana were intimidated by armed bystanders holding assault weapons8
